And so we ask, this day, as we enter your presence, for more than a day, Lord, far more. We ask for a lifetime in your presence, Lord, bringing healing where there is need, knowledge of you where there is none.

Intercessory Prayers

Indeed Father, we recognise that as a Fellowship this morning in the gifts of produce we have brought, the financial gifts we give for the work of Your church and through our meeting together either at the church or online to worship.

Be close we pray, to those in the fellowship and others we know of going through a difficult time in their lives – be close to them and give them that sense of your presence that brings peace. We pray for the young people who are going to be the recipients of the food and other products given today. Each of them have experienced difficult, even traumatic things in their lives. Help them to find their way and purpose in this world; most of all may they find the ultimate truth and hope about life that only comes through following Jesus.

The Lord's Prayer

TEARFUND PRESENTATION

Sue spoke from Ruth 2:1-11which is he story of Ruth gleaning on the fields of Boaz, and of Boaz showing compassion on her. We were reminded of how the Law made provision for the poorest and the foreigner to obtain food by allowing then to glean fields at harvest time. Boaz was prepared to go above and beyond to help this poor Moabite woman. It was pointed out that was as God's people are called to help the poorest in our world and Tearfund has followed God's call to do this for 50 years now. We were introduced to Tamam, a refugee from Syria, living in a slum in Beruit and needing help. Here is the Tearfund description of her.

"Tamam never imagined her world falling apart the way it did. She has a photo of her husband, her small son and her beautiful garden in Syria. All that's left of those beloved things now is the picture. Caught in the crossfire and forced to flee their home when the conflict came, Tamam and her four remaining children sought safety in neighbouring Lebanon. But it's not the same. It's not the home she remembers and loved and lost. Now she and her family live in two small, cramped rooms in a slum in Beirut. Tearfund's local partner, the Tahaddi Center, has helped bring some help, comfort and hope for Tamam and others like her in the midst of such sadness.

"Please will you help people like Tamam and her children? We are making amazing progress. According to the World Bank, over the last 20 years we have seen the rate of extreme poverty reduce by half around the world. Through the generous giving of people just like you, we've been a part of this result. Tearfund and our partners have been able to reach over 48 million people in the last few years alone. But there is more to be done. Just under a billion people on the planet still live on less than £1.50 per day. That's 1 in 7 people who can't afford to eat properly, to feed their children, to access education for them, or to pay medical bills. As the church – the body of Christ on earth, we must reach out. For people like Tamam and her family, we need to stand in the gap. We need to help provide the tools for them to move from hunger, trauma and fear, to a future with hope. Your gift is powerful in God's hands whatever the amount."

Tearfund Prayers *led by Mark (using Tearfund material)*

God has always been the God of the poor and the friend of the weak. In the story of Ruth this morning, we heard that the poorest were cared for in each community and that included a provision for the poor to glean crops in fields being harvested. Here's the command for it in Leviticus:

Leviticus 23 ²² "When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and for the foreigner residing among you. I am the LORD your God."

Angela challenged us as to our response to the poorest in our world. So let's do the most basic thing we can when we hear stories like the one we have heard today: pray!

Lord, we bring to mind all that Tamam went through. Seeing her home and family life destroyed, and forced to make the agonising decision to flee her own country to live in a foreign land.

Help us to stand alongside families who have lost almost everything through conflict and displacement. Help us to share your compassion with people in greatest need who feel broken and abandoned.

Father God, we ask you not to let us look away. Show us how we can respond to situations like Tamam's that can seem overwhelming. We pray that all families fleeing their homes will find a place of welcome and safety. Help us to play our part in restoring a sense of home.

Amen.

Let's pray this together: We ask for a broken spirit, Lord, that in the ashes of our own will, you will grow a spirit that longs for justice. We ask that from these ashes will grow a desire to end poverty, Lord, as we work with churches around the world. Better is one day in your presence, Lord, so let us today remain at your feet.

For Reflection and Discussion

- 4. Apart from supporting Tearfund and similar organisations, what other things can we do to show compassion to the poor and strangers in our society?
