Grant Lord, that our Church here in Maidstone Road will be illuminated by His light and shine forth in the world. May the devotion of the shepherds, the adoration of the angels, and the love shown to us by you Lord, inspire us in our worship this day and through the coming year:

The Big Christmas Quiz

Afterwards, I'll give you the answers with any explanation that goes with it. Why not pit yourselves with others in your family?

So here we go then. True or Trump.

- 1 King Herod the Great's first wife was called Ada.
- 2 Jesus was born in the first century BC.
- 3 Mary rode a donkey as she and Joseph made the trip from Nazareth.
- 4 Jesus commanded that his birthday be celebrated each year.
- 5 Elizabeth was 78 years when she gave birth to John the Baptist.
- 6 Zechariah had to confirm John's name in writing when he was born.
- 7 Jesus was born in a manger.
- 8 Joseph and Mary were refugees in Egypt.
- 9 John the Baptist was about 6 months older than Jesus.
- 10 The prophetess Anna wasn't a Jew.

Answers

- 1 Don't be silly. Herod's first wife wasn't Ada, she was called Doris. That's bit's not in the bible incidentally; we know it from historical study.
- 2 True. He was born between 4 and 8BC. Herod the Great died in 4BC. The makers of our calendars got the date of his birth wrong.
- 3 Definitely not. It is very unwise for a highly pregnant woman to ride any animal. She would have walked or used a cart.
- 4 Jesus never commanded that Christmas be observed. Or Easter for that matter. He only said that his death should be marked through communion and that should be often and anytime.
- 5 Fake news. We don't know how old she was other than she was beyond childbearing age.

We give and receive gifts at Christmas because God gave His own Son to rescue us and in turn he gave his life to do that, because he loved us so much. He now also offers to give us the gift of eternal life if only we would accept it. The Magi gave Jesus expensive gifts worthy of his kingly status as a mark of worship and honour.

We give gifts at Christmas to those we love, or those we want to show friendship to. I hope we have received many great gifts this year. Or have you received some useless tat, perhaps an unwanted gift that has been doing the rounds for a few years?
